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Chairman's Corner

Welcome to the 2022 football season. Let's hope we don't have too much COVID-19 disruption with postponements as we have experienced in the pre-season Powerex Tournament for the Hilton-Petone Cup.

We are pleased to have appointed Ryan Edwards as our new First Team coach for 2022. Ryan will be doing this role as well as being our director of football, overseeing our football programme and pathway from junior to youth to senior football for males and females.

Ryan has assembled a great support team with assistant coaches Jamie Forsyth, Maika Ruyter-Hooley and Stu Pyne arriving in July, Kieran McMinn as our strength and conditioning coach, Barnaby Verbene our physio from TBI Health and new First Team manager Gavin Siegel. We warmly welcome you all to our Petone FC family and thank you for your services.

The club has assembled a great squad which is ready to compete strongly in the Central League this year, with a real focus on enjoying their football and giving all supporters an enjoyable matchday experience. They had a great pre-season run and with the carrot of National League football at the end of the year, the lads will be extra pumped to perform well. We welcome back loyal Petone players and new players to our squad as well.

Our Women's W-League Team will be pushing hard this year to improve their position from last season, again with new coach Ryan McGlinchey, assistant coach Linda Roeters and manager and women's football co-ordinator Julia Harrison. We have assembled a strong team with a couple of new players and most of last year's players staying with us.

Our Women's Reserve Team is also strengthened this year to compete in either Capital Premier or Capital One (yet to be decided). We are still looking for a coach, but Andy Badrick is helping us out in this space for the next month or so. This is a solid squad of young and older players to support the younger players in tough competition. We also have a great Women's U18 development squad lined up to complete a very strong presence in women's football for Petone. All players in our women's senior program are being coached at a high standard and all are competing for spots in the highest team they can play in.

Our Men's Reserve Team is looking strong this year with coach Richard Kerr-Bell, assistant coach Craig Tweedie and manager Nadine Bowen looking after this team with a nice balance of young and old players focusing on player development and a pathway to the First Team. The guys will be looking to





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compete strongly in Capital 2 and win promotion back to Capital 1 straight away after relegation last year. We are really looking forward to seeing them perform well this year.

With some great support from Chris Hosnell and Krish Chand, we have a solid group of payers in our Third Team playing in Capital 2 as well, so we will have a couple of great internal club derbies with Seconds vs Thirds home games to look out for. We have also assembled a club Fourth Team starting in Wellington 4, which will be filled with our young talent aspiring to be in our Reserve team and providing that pathway for them – hopefully they do well and move up the grades quickly.

The Powerex Tournament for the Hilton-Petone Cup was well run by Barry Pickering again. There has been a lot of disruption to games due to teams being affected by COVID-19. The Division 1 final between Petone and Olympic is planned to be played on Easter Monday and the Division 2 final between the Petone Third Team and Waterside Karori B will be played tomorrow (March 27). We have received very positive feedback from participants about the tournament's integrity and the effort that Barry puts in to manage it with all of the last-minute changes each week. Well done and thank you Barry and your team of volunteers that made this tournament work so well again.

We are part of the Capital Football Junior Development Programme again with the support of our sponsors Mitre 10 MEGA and Armstrong Subaru. The Petone Settlers Talent Centre continues to be directed by Ryan Edwards now in his second year. Ryan continues providing great leadership to the programme to take it to the next level and provide value to the participants and their parents. We have three Talent Development Programme (TDP) teams in grades U13, U15 and U17 and I'll keep you updated on their progress through the year.

Our junior club is huge again this year with so many volunteers making it enjoyable and fun for players and their families. The dedication to keeping children in our football community engaged and improving their skills is awesome to see, and our club is very

Coach's Comment – Men's First Team

We are excited to get the season underway and, for me, there is no better way than hosting Wellington Olympic – last year's champions, my old club as player and many people's favourite team to beat. I was immediately excited when I saw the draw, Olympic is certainly one of Wellington's great clubs, with a proud history and so many wonderful club people. I personally loved all of my years at the club and will always speak highly of everyone I got to know over my years there. However, that takes nothing away from my desire to beat them today and every other day we play them.

Getting to this point has been an enjoyable challenge, but definitely a challenge. The build up to the season has felt like a journey before a journey, especially with COVID-19 thrown in the mix (as I write this, we are suffering a mini-outbreak with a number of players contracting the virus, ruling them out for today's game). Taking over the team at the end of last season I was under no illusion that I faced a difficult scenario – there was no-one in the coaching team left, only a handful of players remaining in the squad (less than a starting XI), and a strong



feeling of lethargy and disillusionment from the playing group after what has been a number of tough seasons.

Once I fully understood the position we were in, I quickly made my priorities over the summer:

- 1) build a highly-competent and committed team of staff to work across the senior teams
- 2 retain and bring back passionate Petone FC players who care about the club
- 3) put the mahi in to ensure a positive, enjoyable and professional environment

I am confident we have done a strong job in all three areas over the preseason.

We have two fantastic team managers that I have been hugely impressed by in Gavin Siegel and Nadine Bowen. In all my years of senior football they are second to none. Our coaching team is well qualified and highly respected in the community. We have Jamie Forsyth, Maika Ruyter-Hooley and Stu Pyne all coming in to work alongside me with the First Team. And we are incredibly fortunate to have Richard Kerr-Bell, supported by Craig Tweedy, taking the Reserve Team this season. We have also brought in Kieran McMinn and Barnaby Verbene to deliver strength and conditioning and medical services

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(respectively) for both squads. We are being further supported by Lydia Edwards who has provided guidance on utilising performance psychology in the environment.

On the playing front we have retained long-term Petone players in Ethan Claridge, Seth Loughran, Hamiora Paranihi-Nuku, Ollie Pickering, Josh Zartorski, Alex Shepherd-Reynolds, Isaac Snell, Matt Jones and James Nash, but we have promisingly seen the return of other long-term Petone players in Shea Stapleton, Sefa Mamea-Hind, Sam Pickering, Zach Watson, Luke Grindlay, Jordan Pickering and Jimmy Murdoch-Gibbs . We have added to this with some exciting new young talent in Brynn Sinclair – a tough ball-playing centre back – and Jamaya Shearer and Alden Suri – both electric wingers that perfectly suit our playing style. We are also very fortunate to have picked up Callum Brooker, Max Winterton and Kieran McMinn – three very intelligent footballers, the latter being a player we would like to see push for Golden Boot this season.

The buzz in the training environment has exceeded expectations. The coaching team have put in countless hours over the summer to prepare the training programme for the players. However, what has really made trainings so enjoyable and rewarding over preseason has being the attitude of the playing group. The players have embraced the new playing philosophy, they have worked very hard, and their attendance and willingness to learn has been first class. Their best quality, however, is how welcoming they have been to every member of staff and any new player to the group. I have been continually impressed by what a fine group of young men this club has. It is no doubt influenced by the volunteers and leadership this club has. Long-serving members such as Barry Pickering, Matt Bliss, Graham Hickling, Wayne Ebert, Karl Whalen, Michael Pickering and many others have clearly set a fine example of what being a good person and a good club member looks like.

Building on from the aforementioned successes in preseason, this season is about making sure football is fun. I want the players to be part of an enjoyable culture. Winning is a big part of enjoyment in competitive sport, no doubt. However, you can't get to the end of 90 minutes, having a good game, with many enjoyable moments, only to look back on it and see it as all unenjoyable simply because the scoreline was not in your favour – in my mind there is far more to football than just the result. I have been driving home the message to the team — our new philosophy at its core is all about the three “Es”.

We must make football:

- 🏆 enjoyable to play
- 🏆 exciting to watch
- 🏆 energising to coach

Win or lose we must deliver on those three outcomes. I want our football to inspire junior players to become First Team players and motivate spectators to

get back in their local community and watch football games together. Again, that's not to say we won't go out trying to win every game. We will definitely go out to win every game. But, for me, there is a "way" to play the sport you love. I want us to be winners, but win the right way – we have fun, we work hard and we are always humble.

So, expect from us this season:

- a desire to dominate the game with intelligent possession of the ball
- efforts to control the tempo of the game with our passing and pressing – sometimes slow, sometimes fast, but always with purpose
- a willingness to show x-factor – I want our players to be creative, try to hit long passes, try to shoot from distance, try to take a player on one-on-one

It is my belief that all of these things combined make football fun to play and great to watch. It is my job to make sure we do these things to the best of our





ability and in a way that will win us every game possible. I am sure those that have seen us over preseason will have got a good taste of what this new-look Petone is about.

Nevertheless, regardless of the strength of our preseason, I am sure on the back of last year's results the group will likely be seen by many as one of the favourites to be relegated. We are going into the season with much higher ambitions. We are a strong group, that can beat anyone on the day, I am very confident of that. It is simply a journey now to get every member of the playing group to share that same belief and know they can deliver on it. As soon as we click on this, I am confident we will consistently take points – we have planned for playing this summer in the National League.

A massive thank you to everyone involved so far, but in particular Barry, Jamie, Richard and Gav who have put in huge amounts of selfless work behind the scenes to support me. I am very grateful for all of their efforts and support over the past six months.

This season is going to be a lot of fun, so enjoy the ride and please be proud of how distinctively “Petone” this group of players are. They care about this club and they will work hard to deserve your support.

Enjoy the year.

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Settler Q&A – Paul Whitmarsh

Former Petone FC Men's First Team marksman and later coach, Paul Whitmarsh, is the focus of this edition's Settler Q&A.

Do you recall when you first started playing football and any memories from that game/time?

I was four and filled in for my brother's team at Bishop Park, Eastbourne. I was instantly hooked and that is where I fell in love with the game.

Can you recall your debut for Petone FC?

I joined Petone FC as a 24-year-old and made my debut on Easter Friday in April 1999. We lost 3-2 to Raumatī Hearts at Weka Park. I scored my first goal for the club with my left foot after being put through one-on-one with the keeper.

Why did you join Petone FC?

I had previously played six seasons of Central League and three summers of National League with other clubs, and newly-appointed coach Grant Turner rang me on my land line and basically told me that I had to play for Petone FC. When "GT" tells you to do something he is a hard man to turn down. Also, my girlfriend at the time (now my wife) was a Pickering and having that family connection to the club was a big drawcard.

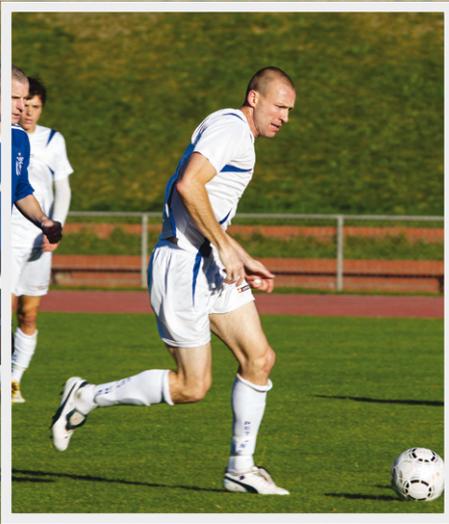
What were your main position(s) and what attracted you to those?

As a teenager I played in every position (including goalkeeper once) but was mainly a defender or midfielder. I enjoyed right back or centre midfield. My coach at the time, Trevor Coad (Lower Hutt City), converted me to a striker

when I was 20 as we had a few injuries in the team. I scored against North Wellington in the mud of Alex Moore Park and I never played in any other position ever again.

Being a striker suited my personality much better as I could be more proactive with what I wanted to do, rather than being reactive to the opposition like when you are a defender. I found out that I was a natural goal scorer and there is no better football feeling than scoring goals. I also enjoyed having the added pressure and responsibility to score that a striker has to carry on their





shoulders – I expected to score every time I stepped on the field.

Career highlights?

As a junior I played in a lot of Hutt Valley rep teams and played at a lot of regional and national tournaments which were always fun, especially the away trips.

As a senior player I didn't really win anything until after I turned 30, and a lot of my friends had already retired, or dropped down the grades – I am glad I stuck at it.

I won the Central League in 2005 and the Chatham Cup in 2006 with

Western Suburbs, and then I returned to Petone FC to win the Capital Premier League in 2007 and get promoted back to the Central League – which was a highlight. We then finished second in the Central League in 2008 with basically the same team. I also played a season for Team Wellington in 2008-2009 at the

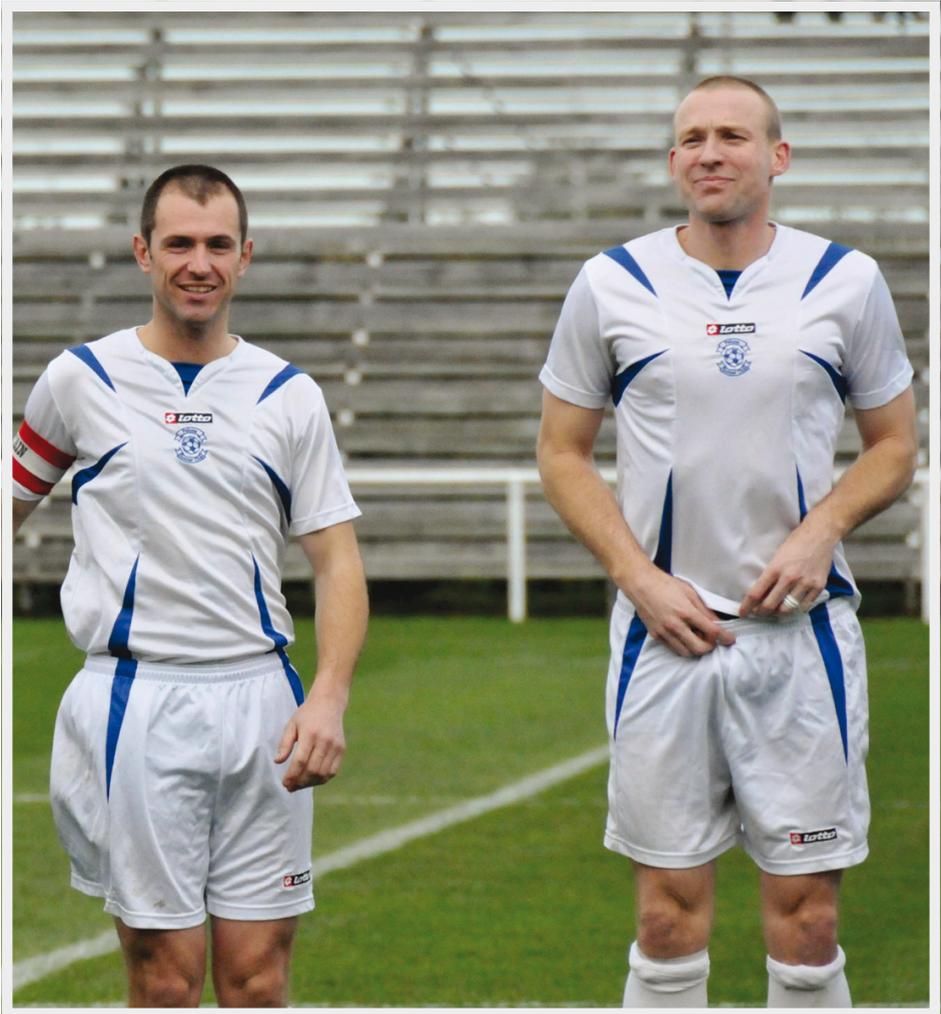
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age of 34. Playing over 200 games and scoring over 100 goals for Petone FC were also milestones I am proud to have achieved as a player. I was also a club Golden Boot five times (two at Petone FC) and nominated for Footballer of the Year several times too. I also have four Hilton-Petone Cup winner's medals and (vaguely) remember scoring a "perfect" hat-trick (including one from halfway) in the 2000 final as we beat Miramar 3-2.

As a coach winning the Capital Premier League and getting promoted to the Central League in 2019 was a big highlight. We were 4-0 down after 80 minutes of the first play-off game and then came back to win 6-5 on aggregate. Also, in 2018 we made the Napier U19 semifinals which was the furthest the club had gone for a long time.



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Any notable disappointments?

I never got relegated as a player but was coach when the First Team was relegated in 2016 and that was a sad day for all involved. As a player, I missed more games through suspension than injury and getting sent off was always disappointing, as I hated letting my team-mates and club down. The lack of a decent Chatham Cup run for the club was also disappointing.

Team-mates you've particularly respected/enjoyed?

Over 22 seasons I have had so many team-mates and have played with lots of really good players and good people too. I was lucky enough to play with some of my heroes from the 1981-1982 All White squad in Barry Pickering, Grant Turner and Frank van Hattum, numerous current or future All Whites, and a number of Petone FC club legends like David Lane, Andy Badrick, Brett Williams and Michael Pickering to name a few.

When/why did you step down as a First Team player and have you played thereafter?

My last season for the first team was in 2014 when I was just short of my 40th birthday. It was getting harder and harder to get around the park and although I scored 14 goals that season, my minutes were much reduced and I knew it was time to retire and let someone else wear the Number 9 jersey, and I wanted to get into coaching to help the club.

After six years of involvement with the First Team as a coach I have also played a little bit of masters football which has been mildly enjoyable when I am not injured.

What other roles have you had in the club over the years?

First Team and U19 Assistant coach 2015-2016, First Team and U19 Coach 2016-2019.

Have other family members played for/had any involvement in the club?

None from my own family but all of the Pickerings have been involved over the years.

Any thoughts on the game overall – ie, things you are or aren't liking today?

At one stage we had ten players over 30 in the First Team – that will never happen again as it really is a young person's game now, with the teams getting younger and younger. However, the younger players are missing out learning from the experienced players and that is a shame.

Lastly, any final thoughts on what Petone FC has meant to you and your family?

I have spent a lot of time at Memorial Park over the years and have some great memories.

Rev JD Russell and St Augustine's connection

An Anglican church hall was opened in 1880 as part of the Lower Hutt Parish. In 1895 Petone became a parochial district and in 1897 Rev JD (John) Russell was appointed as its first vicar.

Rev John Russell was born in 1868 in England. As a young man he was advised to emigrate to New Zealand due to poor health. On his arrival in 1889 he commenced his theological studies and he was ordained in Napier then served in Opotiki, Rotorua and Bulls before moving to Petone.

In 1897 he joined forces with a lawyer, HHA (Hector) Renai, with the aim of forming a new football club. The result was the establishment of the Petone Association Football Club, now known as Petone FC.

The club's first patron was Sir James Hector a geologist, naturalist and surgeon, who was the first director of the Geological Survey of New Zealand. He was also, at the time, the Chancellor of the New Zealand University – a governing body that oversaw all universities, and he had previously been the Government Chief Scientist. Mt Hector in the Tararua Range is named after him.

RC Kirk, Mayor of Petone, was the club's president and he held that position for six years.

Hector Renai, a First Team player, was the founding secretary and treasurer and he went on to hold both posts for seven years.

Rev Russell was made a vice-president and club captain. He was also a local football referee.

In addition to a prominent scientist, the Mayor, a vicar and a lawyer, there were also two doctors on the inaugural management committee. Not surprisingly,

the club's origins were characterised by a rounded and professional approach to its management, along with financial stability and community support.

In 1902 St Augustine's Church was built on its Britannia Street site. Rev Russell hosted the club's management meetings at his vestry. In 1908 he was made president of the club. In 1911 he moved to Oamaru where he lived until his death in 1949 at the age of 80.



In 1910 St Augustine's entered a team in the Wellington football competition. They played in the Senior Two grade which was age-restricted. In the only game against Petone, they lost 2-1.

In more recent times the church has hosted presentation ceremonies for the bronze plaques on the Jackson Street Walk of Champions. On October 3, 2020, the Jackson Street Programme unveiled the latest plaques, recognising Petone players Wendi Henderson and Maureen Jacobson. The presentation ceremony was held at the church.

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A Brief History

Formed in 1898, Petone FC is one of the oldest football clubs in New Zealand and is the longest-surviving in our original form – non-amalgamated – in Wellington.

Major on-field achievements have included:

- 🏆 Chatham Cup winners – 1928, 1930 and 1949
- 🏆 Chatham Cup semifinalists – 1994
- 🏆 Chatham Cup quarterfinalists – 1995
- 🏆 Junior National Cup (New Zealand U18) winners – 1979
- 🏆 National Youth Championship (New Zealand U19) winners – 2008
- 🏆 Wellington annual preseason tournament (progressively known as the Hilton-Petone Cup) winners – 1956, 1985, 2000, 2003, 2007, 2010 and 2013
- 🏆 Central League Premier Division winners – 1990
- 🏆 Capital Federation Premier League winners – 2006, 2007 and 2019
- 🏆 Women's Central League winners – 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998

Petone FC also finished runners-up in the Central League Premier Division in 1992, 1996 and 2008 as well as the Capital Federation Premier League in 2005, 2017 and 2018.

The club organises the annual preseason Hilton-Petone Cup tournament which, since 1955, has attracted an almost maximum number of entries from clubs in the Wellington region and which is an established part of the local football scene.
