### **Petone Masters Welcome Female Player**

Petone FC Masters 3 team, Petone Left Over Stew, has welcomed former Women's First Team player, Nadine ("Nads") Bowen in its line up this season.

Nads – who made 142 league appearances for the Petone Women's First Team between the early 2000s to mid 2010s (scoring twice) – says the opportunity has proven an ideal fit.

"This season I felt I needed to retire from the Women's Reserves who, up until last season, were in the Premier League," says Nads.

"I felt a little too old to spend another season as a central defender, chasing players my Daughter's age (16).

"I am loyal to Petone and did not want to play for another club, but still wanted to play the game. So, because there's no longer a lower grade or social women's team at the club – and there's no women's masters league – I asked club secretary Barry Pickering ("Baz") what the situation might be with me playing men's masters."

Nads says she is "thoroughly enjoying" the experience.

"The lads have been so welcoming and inclusive. I am one of the team!

"So far the opposing teams have also been very accepting, and are respecting and treating me like 'one of the lads'.

"There are a few surprised faces in the changing rooms before and after a game but there's been nothing but respect shown."

### **Nothing to Stew About**

Left Over Stew player and team organiser, Chris Clifton, recalls the discussion evolving a couple of years ago at club prizegiving.

"We talked about our respective footballing pathways and what was on offer to me but not to her," says Chris.

"Nads intimated she was keen to leave the women's senior team environment for a slower-paced game with competitors of a similar age group.

"I suggested we try and get her into the men's master's league with the Stews, and she was open to the idea straight off."

Those plans were temporarily shelved as the pandemic unfolded, but things got back on track this year, says Chris.

"Nads approached Baz, who went to Capital Football and got the go-ahead almost immediately.

"She joined a few of us – a mix of Dreamers and Stews – for a regular preseason run, and it was clear to me that she was a good fit. Nads offered her services to the broader men's masters squads as a ring-in or call-up player to be used if and when teams were short.

"However, after discussing the idea of her potentially joining the Stews as a permanent player with some of our senior squad members – and getting a very receptive response – we then offered her a spot, which she gladly accepted."

Chris says Nads has been "a great addition" to the team.





"I've had one squad member say to me on the quiet that he had some reservations at the start, but after seeing her on the pitch and receiving a bollocking from his partner, he had to admit he had been short-sighted.

"To my mind, football is a straightforward game. It is more about ability and intelligence than brawn. So why shouldn't women be able to compete alongside men?"

Chris has discovered at least two overseas instances of women playing in men's football grades:

- Ellen Fokkema for VV Foarut, following the Dutch Football Association changing its eligibility rules – <u>https://www.espn.com/soccer/netherlands-nedw/story/4484235/ellen-fokkema-made-dutch-history-by-playing-for-a-Men's-team-i-hope-i-wont-be-the-last</u>
- Yuki Nagasato for Hayabusa Eleven, a team in which her brother Genki also plays – <u>https://www.espn.com/soccer/united-states-nwsl-challenge-cup-and-fall/story/4177247/japan-woMen's-wc-winner-yuki-nagasato-signs-for-amateur-Men's-club</u>

"We are constantly reminded that keeping fit is paramount to good health and longevity, so why not remove the barriers to women and promote the alternatives?

"Until there are enough women to create their master's league, why not promote the current league as inclusive?

"I hope this is the start of something bigger and am very proud to be part of the change for more inclusivity in football. I am grateful to my team and the club for making this happen, and I feel honoured and privileged to have Nads as a member of the Left Over Stew."

### A Changing World

Baz adds that gaining official sanction was a "fairly simple" exercise.

"There has been recent precedence where Football Ferns played Capital Premier for Miramar to give them competitive game time before the last Women's World Cup," he says.

"We sought approval from Capital Football and this was granted, after I believe they checked with other masters clubs in a general note.

"This is the first time Petone FC has had a woman playing in a men's league and first woman to play in the men's masters leagues to my knowledge."

The development has also been welcomed by former Petone Men's First Team captain, Dave MacIntyre, given his personal experience of the opposite outcome. He had been involved in a Massey University team which sought – unsuccessfully – to have a women play in its midst in lower grades in the late-1990s.

"I had moved up the line and knew a few ex-Central League and National League players who were then playing for Massey University in the Manawatū-Horowhenua league who were mainly in their 40s, so a good semi-social team," says Dave.

"Most of the team consisted of Massey staff, many of them professors, and one was a woman – Professor Megan McKenzie – who had played a high level of women's football in Canada. Megan duly accepted an invite to play for the team and did well.

"But, after a couple of matches, this suddenly became a national issue. From memory, the New Zealand Football Association (NZFA) stepped in and declared she could not play because this was a senior men's team and there was an accepted age limit at which males and females could no longer play in the same team."

Dave recalls there being significant "push back" against the NZFA, with the issue making headlines around the country.

"Because, a team of over-40s was hardly going to be setting the world on fire in senior football and she was, after all, a member of the university staff.

"From memory the NZFA held firm because this team, semi-social or not, was classed as a senior team.

"The world has moved on a lot in terms of recognition of women footballers and it is good to see that there is now more flexibility, even if it is at masters' level."

### Settler Q&A – Barry Pickering

A rguably one of if not the most successful and treasured players to have come through the ranks of Petone FC and go on to achieve top domestic and international honours – while also being a committed and humble club contributor – Barry ("Baz") Pickering, is the focus of this edition's Settler Q&A.

## Do you recall when you first started playing football and any memories from that game/time?

I was around six years old when I played my first game for Petone. That was almost 60 years ago and all I can remember is we played at York Park in Moera every Saturday and we used a plastic ball.

### Do you recall your First Team debut?

I made my First Team debut as a 16-year-old against Whanganui at Cooks Gardens and scored the only goal of the match. I received the ball just outside the box, took a little shift to the right and drove it high into the net – something I'll never forget.

### If not covered off already, when did you join Petone FC and why?

The "why" was because big brothers Phil and Les were already at Petone for


four-five seasons and by that stage Mum and Dad were involved in club administration. Little sister Sue and I tagged along to games in those early years, so it was my destiny. Those were the beginnings of the "Pickering Dynasty" at the club.

## What were your main position(s) and what attracted you to those?

I started off as a left half, even though I was right footed. It made me appreciate using both feet and I worked hard on developing my left. I happily played wherever the coach put me and because of that I can honestly say I've played in every position on the park. That same debut senior season I was both a striker and goalkeeper – and that's a whole story in itself ... !

When you're a young lad and your big brothers are pounding the ball at the shed wall, guess who ends up in goal? That shaped me as a goalkeeper and throughout my junior years I dabbled in goal, so when there was a need I always stepped in. A broken toe at the start of the 1976 season saw me do just that and then I couldn't get back out! That was the proper start of my goalkeeping career and within three years I was representing New Zealand.

From a Petone FC perspective, playing a small but vital part in the 1990 Central League championship-winning side – scoring the only goal in the last game after Reserve Team strikers Dion Bartosh and myself were called into the side – is another indelible memory. A tidy header from a Dion cut-back cross!

Other honours:

- Petone "Walk of Champions" member Jackson Street plaque
- Life Member Petone FC
- inducted into Hutt City Sports Legends 2014
- inducted into Wellington Football Hall of Fame 2015

### Any notable disappointments?

The three runners-up medals – particularly the Chatham Cup. Not quite getting to 100 First Team league appearances for Petone – although, it's great that both of our sons, Michael and Sam, have achieved that. Bad injuries at critical stages of my career. But that's football.

### Team-mates you've particularly respected/enjoyed?

There's been many, but if I have to single one out it's the legendary Steve Sumner, a true leader on the park and a tough, uncompromising competitor.

### When did you step down as a First Team player and are you still playing?

The body won't allow it anymore but I still kick every ball on the sideline. I'm just as nervous now before a game as I was when I was playing. My First Team career stretched over a 32-year period after making two appearances in 2004 at the age of 48 – I think that was long enough!

### What other roles have you had in the club over the years?

This is my 29th year on the executive committee, including five years as chair and 19 years as secretary. My roles also encompass senior football co-ordination, grant funding, gear management, matchday management, Hilton-Petone preseason tournament organisation and Capital Football liaison.







New Zealand vs Malaysia 1981

My coaching roles included one season as First Team coach followed by two seasons as National League assistant coach at Hutt Valley United. I've also been a junior coach for 14 years and goalkeeping coach for ten years.

### Have other family members played for/had any involvement in the club?

Where do I start! It's fair to say that EVERY family member down from my Mum and Dad some 65 years ago has been involved in the club. Even little grandson Taylor is a regular down here now.

### Any thoughts on the game overall – ie, things you are or aren't liking today?

First, some advice to youngsters of today – ask not what the club can do for you, but what you can do for the club.

The game is forever changing and progressing and you just have to embrace that and move with the times. However, I do feel that New Zealand Football – by constantly reminding us we are amateurs whilst at the same time challenging clubs to be more professional – are just squeezing more and more out of dedicated club volunteers around the country. The answer is there somewhere, but we haven't quite found it yet.

## Lastly, any final thoughts on what Petone FC has meant to you and your family?

Everything.

### Highly Capped – Alan Kearton

A lan Kearton is one of Petone FC's highest-capped players. He made a Scoring debut for the First Team on April 14, 1956, against Upper Hutt.

Alan played his 100th First Team league game on May 29, 1965, and went on to play at least 150 times for the club. However, records prior to 1968 are incomplete, and he probably played as many as 195 games. Despite being a defender, he scored nine goals during his career.

Alan played his final First Team game in 1969 and then spent a few seasons playing at Eastbourne.

For several years Alan would visit the club on Old Timers' Days. His health now prevents that but he still takes an interest in the club and Bob Walley keeps him up to date when he can.

### **A Brief History**

Formed in 1898, Petone FC is one of the oldest football clubs in New Zealand and is the longest-surviving in our original form – non-amalgamated – in Wellington.

Major on-field achievements have included:

- Chatham Cup winners 1928, 1930 and 1949
- Chatham Cup semifinalists 1994
- Chatham Cup quarterfinalists 1995
- Junior National Cup (New Zealand U18s) winners 1979
- National Youth Championship (New Zealand U19s) winners 2008
- Wellington annual preseason tournament (progressively known as the Hilton-Petone Cup) winners – 1956, 1985, 2000, 2003, 2007, 2010 and 2013
- Central League Premier Division winners 1990
- Capital Federation Premier League winners 2006, 2007 and 2019
- Women's Central League winners 1994, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998
- Women's National U19s Tournament winners 2021

Petone FC also finished runners-up in the Central League Premier Division in 1992, 1996 and 2008 as well as the Capital Federation Premier League in 2005, 2017 and 2018.

The club organises the annual preseason Hilton-Petone Cup tournament which, since 1955, has attracted an almost maximum number of entries from clubs in the Wellington region and which is an established part of the local football scene.
